A Monthly Analysis of Employment, Unemployment and Jobs

April 2018

Unemployment according to the Government's preferred measure was 1.42 million in the three months to March 2018, down 46,000 from the previous three months and down 116,000 from the same period a year ago. The unemployment rate was 4.2%, down 0.2% from the previous three months and down 0.4% from a year earlier.

The unemployment rate for 18-24 year olds was 10.3% in the three months to March 2018, down 0.5% on the quarter and down 0.2% on the year.

There were 407,000 unemployed young people aged from 18 to 24 in the quarter to March 2018. This is down 21,000 on the quarter and down by 18,000 over the year. Comparisons of youth unemployment over time are complicated by the fact that unemployment rates are calculated as the number of unemployed people divided by the economically active


population which excludes those not seeking or available for work. Unemployment rates are not the proportion of the total population who are unemployed. They are the proportion of the economically active population (those in work plus those seeking and available to work) who are unemployed. The long-term

increase in the proportion of young people going into fulltime education reduces the size of the economically active population and therefore increases the unemployment rate.

The seasonally adjusted claimant count figure for the United Kingdom increased by 31,246 last month to 896,955 and was up 105,387 over the year.

The number of people in employment aged 16 and over increased by 197,000 over the quarter to reach 32.34 million. The employment rate for those aged 16 to 64 is now 75.6%.

The number of people in full-time employment increased by 133,000 on the quarter to reach 23.75 million. The number of people in part-time



employment was 8.59 million in the three months to March 2018, up 64,000 on the previous quarter and up 140,000 on the year.


In the three months to March 2018, there were 8.66million economically inactive people aged from 16 to 64, down 115,000 from the previous quarter and down 171,000 from a year earlier.

Average total pay (including bonuses) was £515 per week in March 2018. Over the year total pay for employees in Great Britain increased by 2.6%. Average regular pay (excluding bonuses) was £484 per week in March 2018. Over the year regular pay for employees in Great Britain rose by 2.9%. Between March 2017 and March 2018 there was a 2.3% increase in the Consumer Prices Index.

There were 806,000 job vacancies in the three months to April 2018, down 16,000 from the previous three months but up 17,000 from a year earlier.

There were 1.7 unemployed people per vacancy in the period from January to March 2018, down 0.1 on the quarter and down by 0.3 on the year.

In the three months to March 2018, 96,000 people became redundant in the three months prior to their Labour Force Survey interview. This is



down 11,000 from the previous three months but up 1,000 on the year. The redundancy rate was 3.5 per 1,000 employees, down 0.4 from the previous three months but unchanged from a year earlier.

The Employment Bulletin uses the Claimant Count rather than the count of JSA claimants. This experimental series counts the number of people claiming Jobseeker's Allowance plus those who claim Universal Credit and are required to seek work and be available for work. It replaces the number of people claiming Jobseeker's Allowance as the headline indicator of the number of people claiming benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed.

The unadjusted claimant count figure for the United Kingdom has increased by 31,890 over the month to 925,450. The proportion

unemployed calculated on the residence base now stands at 2.2% of the population aged 16-64.

The number of claimants in Nottinghamshire increased by 60 between March and April 2018. The total of 16,225 is 660 more than it was a year ago (see figure 1).

The proportion unemployed in Nottinghamshire is now 2.2%. This is higher than the East Midlands (1.8%) and equal to the United Kingdom (2.2%).

Between March and April 2018, unemployment increased in three of the four Travel To Work Areas in the County (figure 2). Worksop & Retford experienced the largest increase with a rate of change of 9.7%, followed by Lincoln with 2.4%, and Nottingham with 1.0%. Mansfield had a reduction of 1.6%. Compared with

The rates shown in tables 1-4 are supplied by ONS. They are calculated by expressing the claimant count figures as a proportion of the resident population aged 16-64 derived from the latest mid-year population figures.

April 2017 all of the four TTWA's in the County have increased numbers of claimants. The largest change has been in Worksop & Retford with a rate of change of 25.6% followed by Nottingham with 8.1% and Lincoln with 7.0% and Mansfield with 3.4%.

Un employment increased in four of the seven Local Authority Districts in the County over the month. The largest increases were in Bassetlaw with 8.9% and Ashfield with 2.5%. The largest decreases were in Mansfield with -5.7% and Rushcliffe with

-2.6%.

Unemployment in the City of Nottingham decreased by 10 over the month resulting in a rate of change of 0.1%.

The rates of change have varied throughout the County over the year, from -1.4% in Broxtowe to 27.0% in Bassetlaw. Nottingham City changed by 2.6% over the year.

Un employment increased in five of the eight Parliamentary Constituencies in the County during April. Bassetlaw and Broxtowe recorded the largest increases, experiencing rates of change of

9.5% and 2.5% respectively. Over the month Nottingham East has changed by 0.7%, Nottingham North by 0.3% and Nottingham South by -2.2%.

Over the year the rates of change range from -1.9% in Broxtowe to 28.5% in Bassetlaw. The three Nottingham Constituencies have rates of change of -1.0% in Nottingham East, 6.8% in Nottingham North and 2.3% in Nottingham South.



This experimental series counts the number of people claiming Jobseeker's Allowance plus those who claim Universal Credit and are required to seek work and be available for work and replaces the number of people claiming Jobseeker's Allowance as the headline indicator of the number of people claiming benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed.

All data are rounded to the nearest 5 and may not precisely add to the sum of the number of people claiming JSA, published on Nomis, and the number of people claiming Universal Credit required to seek work, published by DWP, due to independent rounding.



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
